

Picnicking in Waseca County

Now that summer is in full swing and the 4th of July holiday is just around the corner, many of us are spending much more of our time outdoors. Friends and families are seeking faraway vacation spots, beautiful scenery and new experiences. If you do not want to travel as far, you may not even have to leave the county to discover some great area vacations spots. Waseca County has over 1,200 acres of lakes and 450 acres of park land! These areas provide the perfect opportunity for picnicking, hiking and many other outdoor activities.

We have listed four places (with a little of their history) that you may not have visited lately if ever:



1. Courthouse park. This park is located approximately 4 miles south of the city of Waseca. It is a 175-acre park near the Le Sueur River that features picnicking areas, a playground, hiking and horseback riding trails, a horseshoe pit, and multiple camping sites. Incidentally, you might want to keep in mind that the trails are also groomed in the winter for cross country skiing. Why "Courthouse" park? The south end of the park extends to the Wilton Bridge and the edge of the former town of Wilton where the first Waseca County courthouse was once located and is marked by a historic plaque. A plaque also marks the location of a stage coach trail that once travelled through the area on its way to Wilton. You can walk the same trail that the coach took to cross the river.

2. St. Olaf Lake Park. Travelling northeast of New Richland approximately three and a half miles, you will find this fine recreational area. You can take advantage of its concession stand managed by the Red Leaf Café of New Richland

serving snacks, beverages and occasional meals. The park also offers grills, a playground and a nice swimming beach. Adjoining the park back in the day was a Lake Store built in 1897 by a Mr. H. K. Stearns. Mr. Stearns operated it and a boat rental business until his death in 1905. It was then owned by Anton Sybilrud until 1930. The next owner was Selmer Langlie. After three years of ownership, a fire destroyed the store on December 28th, 1993. Undaunted y the fire, Langlie rebuilt the store and also added a nearby roller skating rink which boosted the lakeside appeal of his business. On a side note, when World War II broke out, Langlie was called to serve on the European front, leaving his



wife, Vida to run the store. After a particular brutal battle, Langlie was taken prisoner in Germany. Vida was informed that her husband was missing in action. After several weeks of not knowing where her husband was, she was notified of his status and later of his release. He was released on a medical discharge and was able to return home to run his store again in 1945. After two more years, he sold the store in 1947 to Gilbert and Lillian Bagaason. Later the Bagaasons sold the store to Mr. and Mrs. Al Walskog who owned it until 1972 when it was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Ed Bott. Finally, Tom Vaith purchased the store, closed the business and used it as his residence until it burned down during the Halloween Blizzard of 1991. Thus ended the 90-year history of the St. Olaf Lake Store.



3. Lakeview Park. If you travel to the west end of the county, and take Main Street north through Janesville, you will discover the area's pride and joy. Located on the south end of Lake Elysian, this great recreational area offers ball fields, a boat landing, and a new fishing dock. Rising above the area is the beautiful Lakeview Park with its picnic pavilions and the deer and emu habitat. In 1947, the Berndt family purchased the twenty acres of land that is now Lakeview Park. A park caretaker's house was constructed there in 1957. With a caretaker in place, the local Sportsmen's Club decided to install fencing and create an animal viewing area for the public. In 1958, a football field was installed and used by the Janesville High School

for the next twelve years. Between 1975 and 1979, a softball field, additional fencing, a new bathhouse, parking lots and a concession stand were constructed. A public swimming pool is located nearby in Reinbold's Camping area where you can also park your camper and stay for a getaway. (Fun fact: few people know that the first house erected by a white man in Waseca County was built in 1822 on the borders of Lake Elysian!)

4. Clear Lake Park. This large park is located in northeast Waseca. The City of Waseca purchased the land for the park on the western shore of Clear Lake in 1928. The property had to be groomed and graded to be useable as a park. In 1930 a buckthorn hedge was planted along the north and west borders of the property. Water service was extended to the park and preparations were made for electricity to be installed. The southwest corner of the park was designated as a "tourist park". The addition of a bath house was included in the plan but was put on hold until funds became available. On July 4, 1930, Waseca's newest play-



ground was officially named "Clear Lake Park", the name was selected by a committee from several hundred names submitted by its residents. It was billed as "one of the finest lakes in the southern half of the state", according to the Waseca Herald, July 10, 1930. In fact, "Clear Lake" was submitted by five different people: William Guyer, Fred Perkins, Mary Conway, Ed Staehlin and A. C. Barr. The \$5.00 prize was divided equally among the winners! We do not know the exact year a bath house was built in Clear Lake Park, but early photographs show a small bath house even before the park existed. We do know in June of 1938, the new addition to the bath house was completed, a project sponsored by the "Works Progress Administration" (WPA).

There are many more areas you can explore in the county such as Blowers Park, North Shore, Maplewood, and Waldorf's Eustice Park. I hope that the rest of your summer is filled with happy and fun memories with your family and friends. We have such a short amount of time we are comfortably able to enjoy our time spent outdoors in Minnesota, that we need to make every minute count. We can't wait to see you all at the Lakefest and the Fair.




